# Erin Hyunhee Kang: A Home In Between

Painter, graphic designer, and illustrator Erin Hyunhee Kang is driven by observed spaces of diaspora as metaphors for her life and identity. Kang moved to the United States at the age of 15 and felt a duality and clash between Eastern and Western values. Her work aims to create a kind of middle ground and a further exploration of her identity not only as a Korean American but also as a female, a mother, and a wife. Kang's practice explores the subconscious, often resulting in surreal, fragmented landscapes that are simultaneously serene and chaotic. She incorporates elements of the natural world, figures, and architecture while building a new home as a site of belonging, resistance, and healing.

A Home In Between features Kang's latest body of work, which centers around destruction, repair, and resilience in the wake of the 2021 Marshall Fire in Boulder County. After her home was severely damaged during the fire, the artist experienced concurrent emotions ranging from loss and revival to hope and despair, and survival and guilt. As the experience of repair and reconstruction unfolded for Kang, she began to view the home as a space where her conflicting emotions co-exist. At the same time, this deeply personal space is perhaps the only place where healing, reconciliation, and forgiveness can take place.

Kang's installation in Union Works Gallery explores the intersection of photography and projection, marking a slight departure from the artist's emphasis on painting and drawing. After the fire, Kang took photographs of homes and landscapes in her neighborhood to both capture the devastation and preserve and honor what remained. The artist's affinity for architecture drew her to document parts of homes in fragile states, such as shingles, roofs, and windows. Kang digitally collaged sections of the images together to create fragmented landscapes that are contemplative and frenetic at the same time.

A Home In Between continues Kang's internal sense of struggle in observing spaces of diaspora while simultaneously exploring her identity. As viewers enter the dimly lit gallery, they encounter four digital drawings projected directly onto the walls, alongside two charcoal drawings. The black and white digital images float along the wall in a ghost-like fashion, shrouded in nostalgia and haunting beauty.

The piece titled A Home in Between, Partial C: God's plan for the redemption depicts a damaged home sitting atop a rock formation surrounded by water. The home's facade is torn open like an uncovered wound, and the foundation sits exposed as smoke billows from the chimney. While the work clearly evidences destruction and loss, there are glimmers of hope or optimism embedded within this and each surrounding piece. Kang achieves this balance by incorporating elements such as water and livestock that symbolize life, fertility, and hope. Across the gallery, she presents a colorful, large-scale drawing adjacent to a wall of sketches that inspired this new body of work. Together, these works weave a hopeful, uplifting narrative into the space and conjure thoughts of growth, healing, and regeneration.

#### Artist Biographies

**Erin Hyunhee Kang** is a painter, graphic designer, and illustrator based in Boulder. Born in Seoul, Korea, Kang moved to the United States when she was 15. She earned her BFA from Rhode Island School of Design, where she was selected for study abroad programs in Rome and Seoul.

Kang worked for *The New Yorker* at Condé Nast as a photograph assistant and for the visual effects team at Tapehouse Toons. For many years, she was a book jacket designer at Penguin Group USA.

In Boulder, Kang has been a high school visual arts teacher at Boulder Valley School District and a member of the Boulder Creative Collective. Her freelance clients include Penguin Random House, Denver Art Museum, and Denver Health. She is currently pursuing her Master of Fine Arts Practice at the University of Colorado Boulder. Kang has recently exhibited her work at Artworks Loveland, AKA Gallery, and Dairy Arts Center.
