- What emotions do you feel when you look at this art?




Let's meet our artists!

## **Richard Carter**

**Richard Carter** uses bold colors and big shapes, inspired by math and science. He trained with Herbert Bayer, a leader in the Bauhaus design movement. **Bauhaus** is a style that uses abstract images, shapes, and simple, clean designs.

#### 1. TRY THIS!

Some Bauhaus artists believed that shapes were associated with colors. Does blue feel soft and round like a circle, or sharp and pointy like a triangle? Explore the colors that inspire you by coloring in the shapes below.



## **James Surls**

**James Surls** is a sculptor who uses repeating ideas in his work like flowers, houses, and thorns to contrast the delicate with the sharp. He tries to transform the familiar into the unfamiliar and makes us think about everyday things from a new angle.

### 2. TRY THIS!

Write a poem or short story about one of James Surls' sculptures. Try using some of these words: hard, soft, pointy, smooth, thorny, delicate, wooden, metallic, winding, home.




## **Charmaine Locke**

Charmaine Locke uses symbol and metaphor in her art to raise awareness about many important (and oftentimes scary) issues in our world. In her drawings, she uses the color red to communicate strong emotions.

#### 3. TRY THIS!

Draw a simple drawing in each rectangle. Color one drawing with warm colors (red, orange, yellow) and the other with cool colors (blue, green, purple). Do your drawings feel different from each other?



### **Jody Guralnik**

Jody Guralnik makes abstract art inspired by microscopic interconnected patterns and structures found in nature, such as fungi. For example, did you know that mushrooms are connected by a special root system called mycelium? Her artwork tries to remind us of the networks that connect all manners of life on earth.





#### 4. TRY THIS!

Imagine you are holding a magnifying glass to look closely at a plant, a rock or at the bark of a tree. Make a drawing of all the tiny things you can see.
